## From the Manse

Dear Friends,

As part of a Presbytery initiative called Local Church Review, the Kirk Session has been doing some self-reflection. This has involved us thinking about our work in St Ninians Old under the following headings;

Worship;            Evangelism;  
Service;            Discipleship;  
Fellowship.



We have also reflected on our relationship with the wider Church, the resources we have (people, buildings and money), the way we communicate our vision and mission and leadership within the congregation.

In addition, we have been asked by the Presbytery to set goals for the future. These goals are, at the time of writing, being formulated and, once finalised, will be shared with you.

As we set our goals we have been asked to imagine how we would like our Church to look in five years time and then work out how we might get there!

The process is certainly challenging and has involved a lot of thought, prayer and discussion. We have recognised areas in our life as a congregation where we need to 'up our game' as it were while also acknowledging those areas where we are doing well.

In a recent sermon, I spoke of the privilege that is ours in sharing in the work and ministry of Jesus Christ. Our worship and participation in the groups and organisations of the congregation is vitally important but equally so is our work and witness in the parish and beyond.

Being with people and offering them our time and a listening ear can lift a burden and make people feel valued.

Seeing others as Jesus sees them will impact on our outlook and affirm people, especially those who have a lack of self-worth and who feel they do not count.

Sharing a 'word' about Jesus in our place of work, leisure centre, the hospital, school or in our neighbourhood can make all the difference, a difference we ourselves may not fully appreciate.

In reflecting on where we are and where we might like to go in the coming years, I believe that it is our individual response as well as our response as a congregation that will benefit the Church and the wider community, and ensure that the work and ministry of Jesus Christ continues in St Ninians Old and far beyond!

I finish by quoting from a Prayer of Saint Teresa of Avila (1515-1582);

*'Christ has no body now on earth but yours; no hands but yours; no feet but yours. Yours are the eyes through which the compassion of Christ must look out on the world. Yours are the feet with which He is to go about doing good. Yours are the hands with which He is to bless His people'.*

## **The General Assembly of the Church of Scotland**

The General Assembly will meet in Edinburgh from 16<sup>th</sup> -22<sup>nd</sup> May. The Moderator Designate is The Rev Dr Martin Fair. Dr Fair has been Minister of St Andrew's Parish Church in Arbroath since 1992. He has said he hopes to highlight addiction and mental health issues during his year in office. Dr Fair will be the first Moderator from Arbroath to serve as the Kirk's ambassador at home and abroad during what will be the 700<sup>th</sup> anniversary year of the Declaration of Arbroath.

Born in Glasgow, Dr Fair has said 'There is a wonderful opportunity for the Church right now to rediscover its meaning and purpose for the people of Scotland and beyond in the here and now. I am totally fired up as a Minister, and as Moderator, I want to communicate that excitement and positivity'.

Prince William has been appointed Lord High Commissioner to the General Assembly of 2020.

The Lord High Commissioner is the Sovereign's personal representative to the annual General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

During General Assembly week Prince William will attend on behalf of the Sovereign. He will make the opening and closing addresses to the Assembly, as well as carrying out official visits across Scotland.

Last year His Grace the Duke of Buccleuch attended the General Assembly as the Lord High Commissioner, serving in the role for the second time.

Her Majesty The Queen came in person to the General Assembly in 1969 and 2002. Previous members of the Royal Family to be appointed to the role include HRH Prince Charles, HRH The Earl of Wessex and most recently HRH The Princess Royal in 2017. Rev Dr George Whyte, the Principal Clerk of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland said: "We are honoured that her Majesty has appointed Prince William as Lord High Commissioner.

"We look forward to welcoming His Royal Highness to the General Assembly."

'Heart and Soul', an event that celebrates the life and work of the Church will be held from 1-6pm in Princes Street Gardens, Edinburgh on General Assembly Sunday, 17<sup>th</sup> May.

## **St Columba's Church and Allan Park South Church**

The congregations of St Columba's and Allan Park South in Stirling will unite on the 1<sup>st</sup> of April. The present St Columba's building will be retained as the place of worship and will be known as Park Church. Mr McIntyre will complete his time as Interim Moderator of St Columba's when the union takes place. A new Interim Moderator will be appointed to the united congregation. We wish the congregation of Park Church all that is good and look forward to working together in the future.

## **A Milestone Birthday**

Our warmest congratulations go to Mr William Patrick who celebrated his 100<sup>th</sup> birthday on the 20<sup>th</sup> of February. Mr Patrick, who was born in Darvel in Ayrshire, recently became a resident in Annfield House. He and his late wife, Marion, were married in 1939 and they enjoyed almost 78 years together before she passed away in 2017.

## Lent Challenge

Foodbanks' stocks are particularly low around the period of Easter.

The "Lent Challenge" runs along the lines of the "Reverse Advent Calendar", the idea being that for each day of Lent, which began on 26th February, you are asked to put in one item for a local foodbank, in a box or a bag. 40 items are a lot, so it is suggested that you could work as family groups or groups of friends if this seems more feasible.



When you have completed the challenge, please take your goods to your chosen foodbank, or to Church who will pass them on. St Ninians Old Parish Church supports the foodbanks all year round but this could give an added boost.

## StartUp Stirling Update

For the past year, 2019, our congregation donated one quarter of a tonne of goods and £1200 in cash donations. Apart from the supermarkets, which are by far the largest contributors of goods, our congregation were the third highest in the Stirling presbytery behind Bridge of Allan Church and the Allan Church at Bannockburn. Tricia Cumming, the Volunteer Co-ordinator, ask me to pass on her thanks for our congregation's generosity. StartUp are most grateful.

StartUp's day to day financial position remains stable and they continue to see good progress on general donations and community fundraising. At the end of November (eight months through the financial year) there was a modest deficit of £14500. Festive donations and fund raising resulted in more or less an overall break-even position by the end of January.

November also saw the arrival of positive news from the Scottish Government about funding this financial year (£18,000) and next year (£45,000) that will help StartUp's continued delivery and development of crisis food banks and related support service activity. The monies in 2020/2021 have been awarded jointly to StartUp and Stirling District Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB), with the latter also to be receiving a £45,000 sum. This funding is part of a new "Tackling Rural Isolation Project." StartUp will be sharing more information on this project later on in the year.

StartUp are delighted to welcome Glenda McWatt to the new position of General Manager. Glenda comes from Bridge of Allan and joins StartUp after having worked with other organisations such as the RVS and the Cyrenians. Her philosophy in life is "No

regrets. Don't look back. Look forward. Our experiences are all part of our rich tapestry. Learn to accept them all, good and bad. There is no such thing as perfection". We all must admit that's a pretty good philosophy.

The above information was provided by Tricia Cumming, Volunteer Co-ordinator. She is always very appreciative the effort put in by the Congregation of St.Ninians Old Parish Church.

As regards food requirements they are much the same as always but worth a reminder of what they are:- Sauces, instant foods, UHT milk (these are always a priority), tins of fruit, tins of meat, tinned or packaged vegetables, tinned tomatoes, tinned soup, desert tins, tinned fish, biscuits, cereals etc

For StartUp packs there is still a requirement for the following household items:- irons, small frying pans, dusters, washing up liquid, kitchen and toilet rolls, mugs , cooking pots, toasters, kitchen utensils, crockery , cutlery etc. (new or nearly new in the case of hardware items.)

StartUp are most grateful for the continuing contribution from the congregation of St Ninians Old Parish Church.

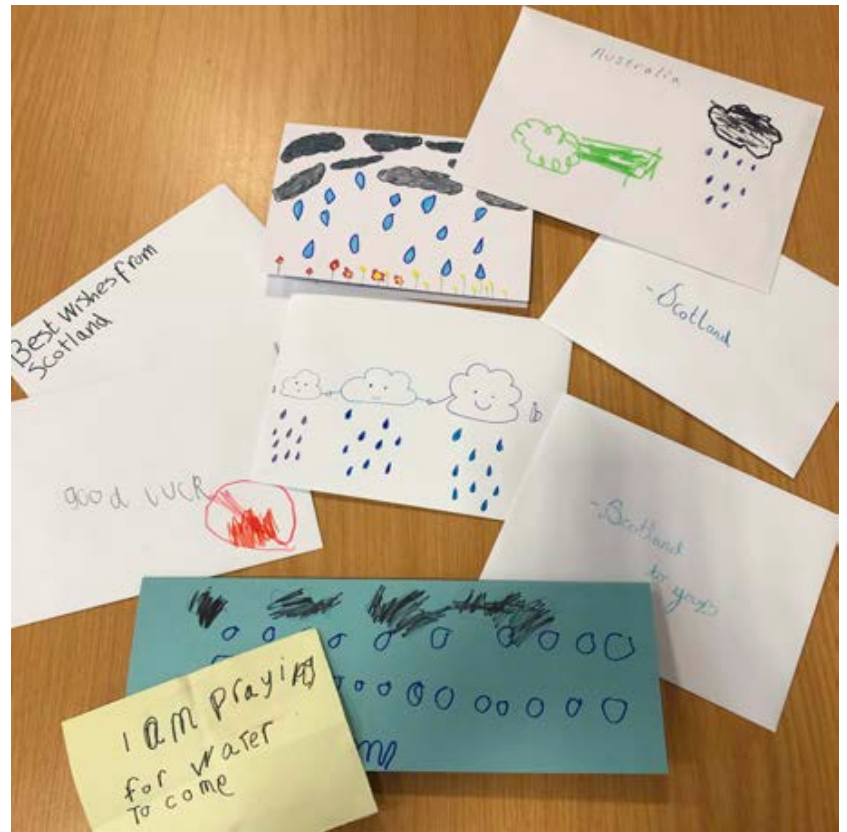

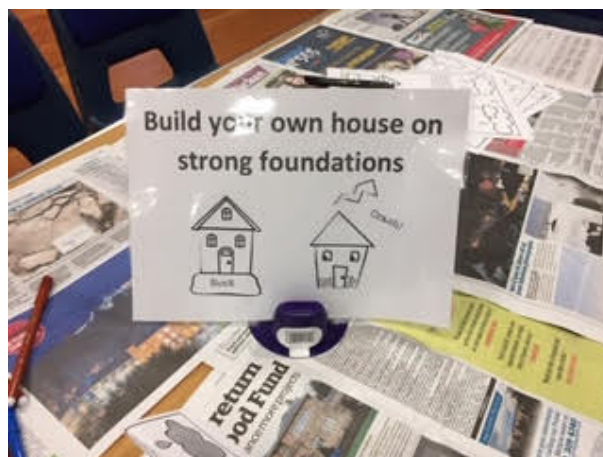
It's going to be another busy term!

## A Trysting Place, The Church

In July 1972, two thousand people gathered together in York Minster. The event being celebrated was its 500th anniversary. The great crowd was also celebrating that the colossal majestic building had been saved from total collapse.

It is a marvel that it was ever built at all, for it took 250 years to complete and is probably the largest church building in the world next to St Peter's in Rome.

A second marvel is that two million pounds were raised to keep the Minster safe and beautiful. The work had been going on for many years and few could remember it without the scaffolding which had by then gone. The Minster had been reborn thanks to the generosity from varied sources.

The construction of Solomon's temple in Jerusalem took a mere seven years. What happened at York Minster both in its original erection and in its renovation far outshines Solomon's efforts. But what was it all for? The original construction and then the restoration. It was undoubtedly a work for God, to provide "A Trysting Place," - a meeting place of The Spirit. It was built and restored as an act of prayer and devotion by Yorkshire men and women. But is it right to try and coop up the omnipresent God in a gothic enclosure, however vast and magnificent? Also, but on a smaller scale, every city, town and village in the UK has at least one church, always conspicuous by their turrets or spires.

God, according to Wordsworth, is to be found in 'the light of the setting suns and the round ocean and the living air; in the blue sky and in the mind of man.' Indeed, it is often claimed it is easier to find God outside the Church than inside.

However there is a necessity for a place and time for worship of our God. In our personal relationships with each other, we require special times of coming together, whether it be parties, celebrations or deep discussions in order to strengthen these relationships.

Our personal relationship with God is no different. Praising God is very important. And where better to do this than in a church, by the singing of hymns? Soon we will be singing the great Easter hymns of the Resurrection, "Jesus Christ is Risen Today", and "To Thine be the Glory, Risen Conquering Son" for example. However in our hymns of praise at Easter we mustn't go directly to the Resurrection and forget the Cross.

Although not so strident as the Resurrection hymns, and strictly speaking not hymns, two wonderful and poignant songs of the Cross are, "The Old Rugged Cross", and "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord?".

Of course beautiful and well known songs are sung throughout the year in churches up and down the land. We of course have the great Christmas carols and other wonderful

hymns which are not connected with either of the great Christian festivals. We owe a lot to the great hymn writers, truly they were blessed by our Father in Heaven.

We all have our favourites. "Love Divine All Love Excelling", "Mine Eyes Have Seen The Glory Of The Coming Of The Lord", "Still the Night", "The Day Thou Gavest Lord Has Ended", "Abide With Me Fast Falls The Eventide", "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" "Oh Love That Will Not Let Me Go" and many more .

Behind some of these well known hymns there is an interesting , sometimes very moving, story of what inspired the writer. We are the beneficiaries. (Some of these stories behind the hymns are well worth telling, perhaps in a future article).

On occasions the hymns are not so well known, perhaps new hymns from CH 4. Nevertheless we should attempt to sing them as they are often there for a reason, perhaps to back up the theme of the Minister's sermon. We should sing them with full gusto as well.

It really does our spirit the world of good to join in the singing of all the hymns. After all we're praising God, Our Father in Heaven, and opens up a deeper union with him. Although not everyone does all the time, perhaps having a wee break for whatever reason. But be aware if you falter, the Minister might just announce, "Stop the music Tony, stop the music. you there, why aren't you singing?" And his finger might point to you!! So when we come to Church on a Sunday, what are we doing there. Why aren't we elsewhere, at the Thistle Centre perhaps, relaxing at home with a good book or getting ready to visit friends or relatives or perhaps getting on with the housework?

Could it be we are there in Church, in that Holy Place, because in some way or other God has spoken to us, perhaps not told us to come but in some subtle way guided us there. There is a need for worshipping with others in a church building. Jesus did not command his followers to continue their devotion to him in isolation, far from it, he bade them to keep assembling together. The importance of meeting together in worship is underlined in the Letter to the Hebrews, Chapter 10, verses 24 and 25:- "We ought to see how each of us may best arouse others to love and active goodness, not staying away from our meetings , as some do, but rather encouraging one another".

The very sight of others within a church service can strengthen our own faith.

There is a need for worshipping with others, and the historical rituals of this Church, St Ninians Old Parish, remind us of the great procession of people who for almost the last 270 years have worshipped here and who are still worshipping with us in the Church, unseen but triumphant!!

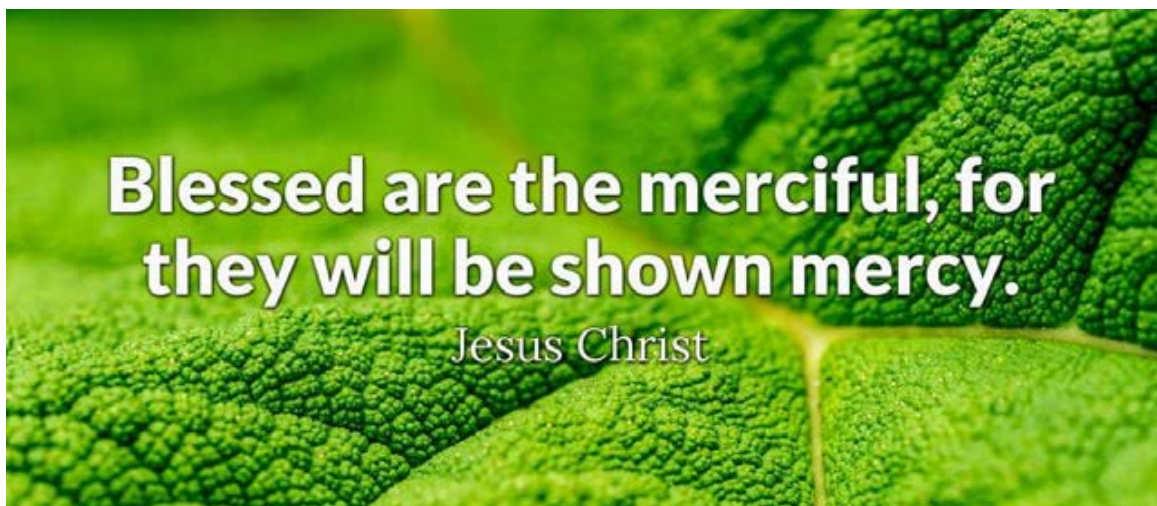
After successful completion of this stage I will be free to look for my own charge and I am looking forward to finding out where God might lead Moira and myself and how our ministry will develop.

## Iconic Places of Worship around the World

Having been privileged to be able to travel around the world and have visited all of the continents apart from Antarctica, I thought it would be interesting to share some of the wonderful places of worship I have visited.

Space does not permit in one issue to write about them all.

The first place of worship I would like to mention is the **Washington National Cathedral** in Washington DC in the United States of America. The imposing building stands at Massachusetts and Wisconsin Avenues in the northwest quadrant of the city. It is a cathedral of the Episcopal Church and is the second largest church building in the United States. The foundation stone was laid on the 29<sup>th</sup>



September 1907 in the presence of the then President, Theodore Roosevelt and some eighty three years later the final finial was placed in the presence of President George H.W. Bush.

Planners hoped that it would have a similar role to Westminster Abbey in a National Role. State Funerals for four American Presidents have been held in The Cathedral; Dwight D Eisenhower, Gerald Ford, Ronald Reagan and in November 2018 George H.W. Bush.

It was also the setting for the final Sunday sermon on March 31<sup>st</sup> 1968 when the Reverend Martin Luther King delivered the sermon from the “Canterbury Pulpit”, just a few days before he was assassinated.

Music plays a big part in the Cathedral. The great organ was installed in 1938 and has been enhanced over the years. The present instrument consists of 189 ranks and 10,647 pipes. The cathedral can boast two choirs, the Cathedral Choir of Men and Boys, founded in 1909 and the Cathedral Choir of Men and Girls founded in 1997. The two choirs currently share service duties and occasionally collaborate.

Three services are held each weekday including the daily Eucharist. Sunday through Thursday the cathedral choirs sing Evensong. On Sundays three services of the Eucharist are held along with Choral Evensong.



The next place of worship I would like to share is the **Catedral D Sevilla** (above) in Spain. The Cathedral is the largest Gothic Cathedral in the world. The history of the Cathedral dates back to 1184 when it was originally a mosque and was subsequently declared a cathedral in 1248 by Ferdinand 111 after the Reconquest of Spain. Work began on the present building in 1434 and has continued over the centuries until 1928.

The total area of the building is 23,500 square metres. The Gothic section alone has a length of 126 metres a width of 83 metres and the height from the centre of the transept is 37 metres. The Cathedral boasts 80 chapels including the Capilla Real.

It is the resting place of Christopher Columbus.

The Giralda is the bell tower of the Cathedral. Originally built as the minaret for the Grand Mosque and inspired by the Koutoubia Mosque Minaret in Marrakesh. It stands some 96 metres tall from the ground to the weather vane.

To complete this article, we cross the Mediterranean to Morocco to the red city of Marrakesh.



The **Koutoubia Mosque** is Marrakesh's most important mosque and was one of the largest places of worship for followers of Islam when it was completed in 1158. Its name means Mosque of the Booksellers, because of the numerous bookstands that surrounded the Mosque when it was first constructed. Non-Muslims may not enter the Koutoubia Mosque nor can they enter any other mosque in Marrakesh.

The highlights of the Mosque are the minaret that stands 69 metres high and the colour of the temple, made of red stone, which is typical of the region. It is the highest building in Marrakesh.

The mosque is ornamented with curved windows, a band of ceramic inlay, pointed fortifications and decorative arches. It also has a large plaza with gardens. The minaret's gleaming brass spire keeps its shine all year thanks to an old Moroccan technique. Each year the balls are filled with mineral-rich salt from the High Atlas Mountains which keeps the spire from oxidising.

Five times a day, one voice rises above the Djemma din as the muezzin calls the faithful to prayer.

## United Mission to Nepal

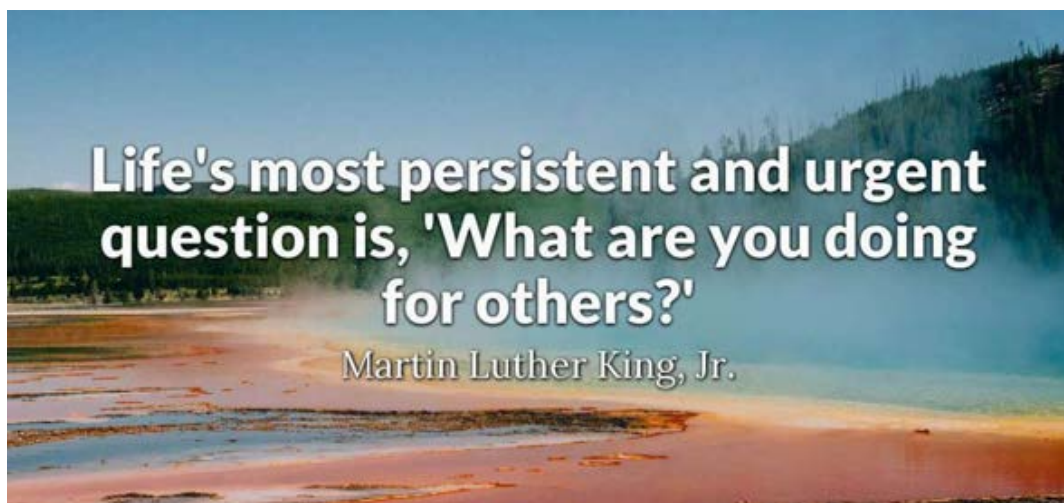

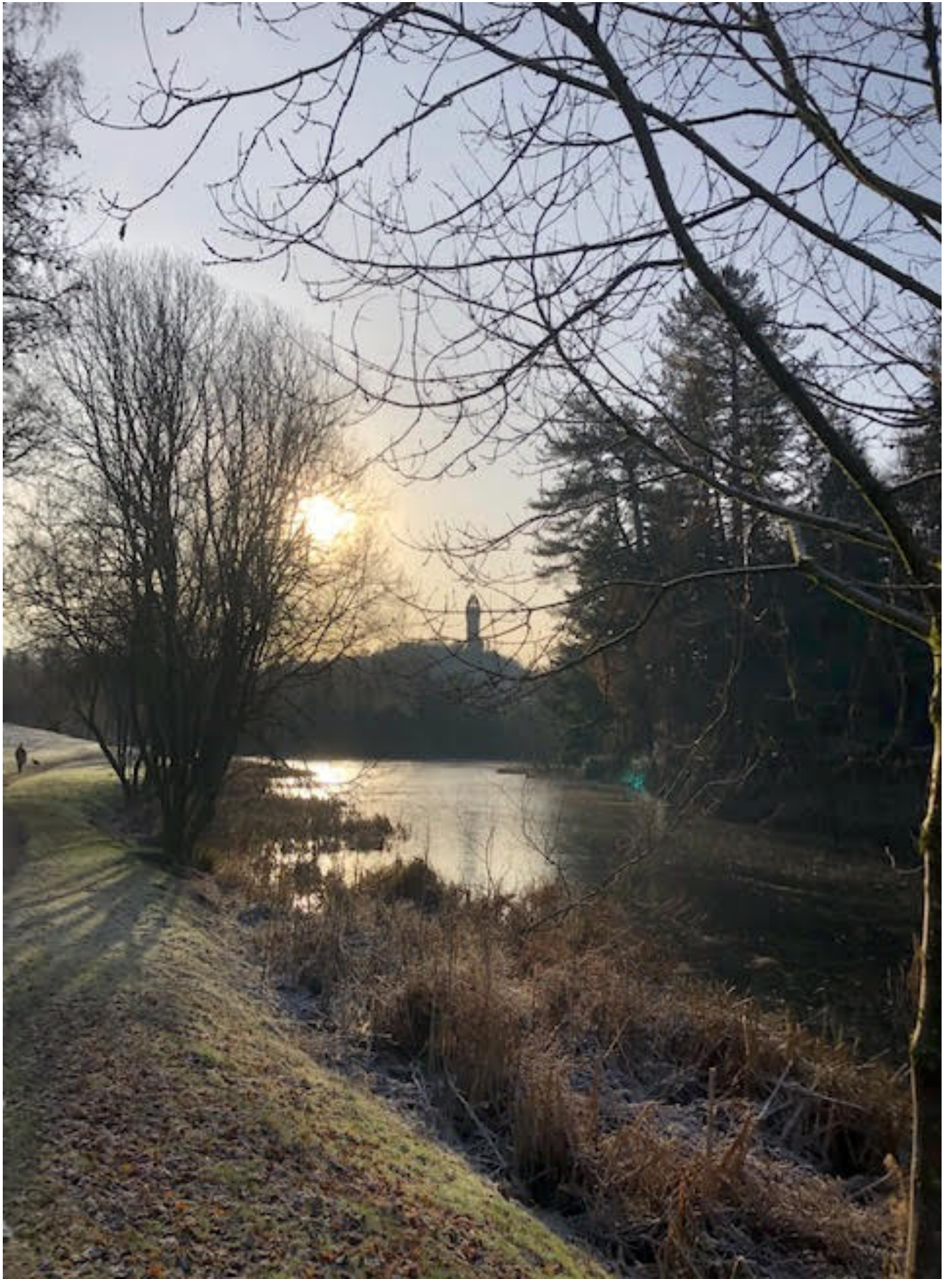
