It is our hope that when the Presbytery of Stirling approves its Mission Plan in the autumn, it will be agreed that the congregations of The Church of the Holy Rude, Park Church, St Ninians Old and Viewfield Erskine will form a 'grouping'. This will enable us to work more closely as the body of Christ witnessing effectively to his love within our respective communities.

As the number of full time ministers of Word and Sacrament reduces to approximately six hundred in the next few years, it is more important than ever that all who are members of the Church use the gifts God has given to us in order that we can continue the work of our Lord.

As colleagues, we are excited at the thought of what we can do by working together and building on past joint ventures, that have enabled us to get to know one another better, and engendered a warm feeling of fellowship and friendship.

We will also, at various times, engage with other Churches in the surrounding area, and we look forward to this happening.

This is a challenging time for the Church of Scotland and inevitably decisions will be made in the coming months that will impact on every congregation. While it would be tempting for some to lose heart, we must draw strength from God and go forward in faith believing that He will not fail us and that His good plans for us will come to pass.

Following His resurrection and prior to His ascension, Jesus gave His followers what we call the Great Commission. He said 'Go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.' That was quite an instruction and, had Jesus left it at that, no doubt His followers would have been filled with anxiety as they thought of going out on their own in obedience to his commandment. But they weren't going out on their own! Jesus reassured them with these words, 'And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age.'

The first followers of Jesus were sent out with the greatest task in history but with them was the greatest presence in the world!

Jesus' promise to be with His people still stands today. Therefore, we look to the future with confidence and great hope, knowing and believing that Jesus is with us and will bless all that we do in His name.





ST FILLAN'S CAVE

During our recent holiday in the East Neuk of Fife we visited the fishing village of Pittenweem. The village has been such since early medieval times. The oldest structure there is St Fillan's Cave situated in Cove Wynd near the harbour. From this ancient sacred cave St. Fillan is said to have converted the local Pictish population to Christianity.

Pittenweem Priory was built over the cave in which St. Fillan lived and worked, reputedly writing by the light shining from his forearm ! The cave was rediscovered in 1990 and can be visited by obtaining a key from the Cocoa Tree Cafe.

A Visit to IONA

It is the kind of island that, once you have made your first visit, no matter how brief, calls you back again and again. This was my 5th return to the peaceful and relaxing island of Iona and the Spring air was fresh and cool while the sun shone for the week.

In 563AD St Columba arrived on the island with 12 of his followers from Ireland and built his first Celtic church there, establishing a monastic community and thereafter setting himself the task of converting most of pagan Scotland and northern England to the Christian faith. Although described as being the birthplace of Christianity in Scotland, St Ninian had already arrived in south west Scotland at Whithorn in 397AD and established Candida Casa, The White House, there.

Country walks and beautiful sandy beaches with turquoise waters are readily available and the main attraction for most visitors is, of course, the atmospheric Iona Abbey which was raided by Vikings in 802, and St Columba's Shrine. The 13th century Nunnery, which is considered the best preserved in Europe, and the local Heritage Centre with the Cafe and sheltered garden are well worth a visit. Birdlife is all around and, in the peace of the surroundings, birdsong can easily be heard and appreciated. Corncrakes are not renowned for their musical abilities but they are there on the island although difficult to spot.

Reverend George McLeod, minister at Govan Old Parish Church in Glasgow and a former Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, was founder of the Iona Community in 1938 and instrumental in the refurbishment of the Abbey, involving unemployed workers and fellow clerics. Abbey services are held daily, are non-denominational and organised by the Iona Community.

Iona can easily be reached by public transport. Bus or train from Glasgow to Oban takes you to the Calmac ferry and the crossing to Craignure on Mull. At certain times the ferry is met there by a bus for the 1 hour scenic journey to Fionnphort (where you leave your car if driving yourself) and a 10 minute ferry crossing then takes you to Iona. It's always a good idea to check timetables for connections and is certainly worth the effort. There are 2 good hotels on the island as well as other types of accommodation.

Easter Code programme for schools March 2022

On Friday 25th and Monday 28th March, Park Church, at last, had the pleasure of hosting the Easter Code programme after a break of 3 years. Around 120 young people in Primary 6 from Allans PS, St Ninians PS and Borestone PS took part.

The children re-enacted the events of Holy Week, and by following some of the experiences of Jesus and his disciples, they participated in foot washing, Easter craft and a Passover meal, as well as hearing about Gethsemane and experiencing being part of a hostile crowd on Good Friday.

In each area the children had to note a keyword, the initial letter of which had to be unscrambled to solve an anagram. The final re-enactment at the tomb enabled them to decode the anagram revealing the word EASTER. They threw themselves into activities and role play with great enthusiasm and from their evaluations it is clear that the majority enjoyed their experiences with a number commenting on what they had learned during the morning/afternoon.

We had revamped some parts of the programme to allow the children more active dramatic participation, and it was gratifying to hear that this had gone down very well with almost everyone. However, it is still a bit of a quandary to decide the best way forward with the code solving, when most are saying that it was too easy and boring whilst others found it more difficult, and yet others really enjoyed the challenge – a conundrum to be worked on for next year. This time also some of the staff comments will also give us food for thought before we plan for next year. .

Comments about what was learned are always eye opening, showing generally little knowledge about the reason behind Easter. This year they included:-.

I learned about the stories of Jesus, about a blind man and a shepherd learned new things about what Jesus did. I learned that some people did not like Jesus I learned that Jesus was killed on the cross I learned that people had the choice to free Jesus I learned a lot more about Jesus and God I didn't learn a lot of new stuff – it was like revision!

And a couple showed a deeper side to their thinking:- *I learned not to judge I learned that being proud takes you nowhere – be humble.* Perhaps it was best summed up in one comment which offered *Overall it was great fun, interesting and unique*

Our groups of helpers were assisted by our friends in St Ninians Old Parish and thanks goes to everyone who helped both to present and support during the two days and to those who gave their time to help set up the gazebo areas.

Sweet Potato and Ginger Soup

Serves 6

Ingredients: One tablespoon Olive oil

30 grams root ginger, peeled and grated (can use dried ginger)

700 grams sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into chunks

One medium onion, chopped

One clove of garlic, chopped (optional)

One litre hot stock

Fresh lime juice or long life lime juice concentrate (optional)

Method:

Heat oil in large deep pan and gently fry onion until softened. Add ginger and garlic and cook for 2 minutes.

Add sweet potato chunk, stir to coat in gingery onion and cook for another 2-3 minutes.

Pour in stock, bring to the boil, then cover and simmer for 15 minutes until sweet potatoes are tender.

Cool slightly and liquidise.

A dash of lime juice may be added before serving.

Volunteers in the kitchen made sure every child went home with a gift box of popcorn and cake with our best wishes and prayers for their future careers at High School next term.





Walking St Cuthbert's Way by Ian Ritchie

My brother, my Best Man and I have taken a week each year for the past few years to do a long-distance walk. This year, to celebrate freedom from lockdown, we decided to walk St Cuthbert's Way from Melrose to Lindisfarne.

St Cuthbert was born in Dunbar c. 634, died 687, near Melrose Abbey. He was the Prior in Melrose, Lindisfarne and Durham but ended his days on Holy Island. He lived at a time when the Celtic Church, with its emphasis on spirituality and contemplation was being strongly influenced by the structures and disciplines of the Roman catholic church. He seems to have been a man who brought people together.

The walk extends for 62.5 miles (100km). It can be done in 4,5 or 6 days but it depends on the availability of accommodation. Some of the stages can be quite long as they pass over the Borders hills.

Poring over the maps and planning your stages is part of the fun. In practice, you soon find that many people have done it before you and there is a recognised route with logical stages.

If you do plan to do the walk, it is a good idea to take advantage of the courier who can take your bags between destinations, leaving you free to walk without a burden. On any pilgrimage, the burden isn't necessarily a physical one!

It is also a good idea to do regular walking for a few weeks before you set out so that you are that bit fitter and your feet are less likely to become sore and blistered.

The walk

We did the walk in 5 days which means that 14 or 15 miles a day for 4 days. The last day was a short 5 miles across the causeway to holy Island and a day spent looking at the priory ruins, seeing the museum and visiting the Castle.

Day 1 Melrose to Jedburgh - 14 miles

We started with a visit to Melrose Abbey ruins which was closed at 0900 on Easter Sunday.

We headed uphill towards the Eildon hills in sunshine and then down towards Bowden and Newtown St Boswell. Lovely green countryside with all the spring foliage coming out and the Eildon Hills behind us.






A great lunch in an Italian restaurant in Newton St Boswell. After lunch, we had a lovely walk along the banks of the river Tweed in sunshine and a gentle breeze.

We live in a country with many cultures. It made me wonder about the Romans who came to this part of the world several hundred years before St Cuthbert lived and whose remains are visible in forts, watch stations all along the route. Indeed, we walked along Dere Street for 3 miles as we approached Jedburgh. And now we have the latest Italian people providing a delicious lunch. I'm grateful for such diversity in our country.

At Liliards Edge, there is a grave commemorating the Maid Liliard who helped the Scots win the Battle of Ancrum Moor in 1545 against Henry VIII in his 'Rough wooing' Scotland.

Clearly, we were not so friendly with our nearest neighbour in the past.

The abbey in Jedburgh is a magnificent ruin but since we got there in the evening and on Easter Sunday, all we could do was look from the outside.



Day 2 Jedburgh to Kirk Yetholm – 15 miles

Again a lovely day with sunny weather but cool enough to make us walk briskly. Fine fertile rolling countryside with a castle at Cessford. We saw much evidence of the effect of Storm Arwen in the uprooted trees on the east side of any stand of trees.

We had lunch a Morebattle, enticed by leaflets offering a free drink at a named hostelry along our way!



After lunch, we climbed steadily up to the top of Wideopen hill which is half way and the highest point along the route.

Then a lovely gentle walk along the top of the hill and down into Kirk Yetholm.

Day 3 Kirk Yetholm to Wooler – 14 miles

Another lovely day starting with a climb to the high moors and the border with England.





Then down to the valley which was lush and green and then up to the moors above Wooler. My memories of the day were of sunshine, good company, curlews a very nosy chaffinch, some gliders enjoying the breeze and the fabulous weather and amazing clouds and finally a grouse standing on a wall and looking at us looking at him/her!

Day 4 Wooler to Beal - 14 miles

This leg of the walk was the last long stretch. It is through some lovely countryside with evidence of prehistoric, Roman and more recent history all around.

We came across St Cuthbert's cave and wondered whether he had ever been there or was it a fable.





Day 5 Beal to Holy Island – 5 miles

We were grateful for a short walk across the causeway to Holy Island with a steady stream of cars heading in the same direction.

I found a letter in the Church of St Mary the Virgin from the Parish of Nidaros in Norway dated 1993, 1200 years after the first Viking raid on Lindisfarne and have quoted two parts from the letter:-

"We commemorate the event of 793 (the assault of the Vikings on the Monastery of Lindisfarne) and the sacrifices of the monks of Lindisfarne with contrite hearts. We honour the memory of St Cuthbert, prior and bishop of Lindisfarne, and greet you in thanksgiving for the Christian heritage we were given to share."

"Pilgrimage is said to be the move toward a sanctuary with the openness to be changed in spirit and to search for new values."

I was taken by the reference to pilgrimage and have since reflected on the way in which our short 'pilgrimage' has changed my view of such things as the arc of history, immigration and national independence amongst many others.

I got a lot from my walk – renewed friendship, good exercise, appreciation of our beautiful country, a better understanding of some history and a chance to think of things beyond the daily walk of life.

I commend it to you, especially if the weather is as good as it was for us.

Dear friends,

Thank you so much for accompanying us in prayer through six and a half years of service with United Mission to Nepal (UMN).

At the end of our time as UMN and Church of Scotland mission partners, these are our continuing priorities for prayer:

1. For UMN's ongoing relationship with the Government of Nepal.

2. For Dhana Lama, Joel's successor as head of UMN.

3. For Fiona's MSc/PhD research into medicinal plants, which will bring us back to Nepal.

4. For Caleb and Isaac to find good friends during our time in the UK.

Throughout March and April, first Joel and then the whole family were on the road, visiting all of UMN's working areas—two hospitals and the six "Cluster offices" where our village-level anti -poverty work is coordinated. It was wonderful to be able to visit the frontline work in person, after the pandemic and our visa interruption in 2021 had kept us away from the Clusters for a long time.

We were consistently delighted and impressed by the work we visited. The restoration of village ponds, with the fishery income and irrigation benefits they provide; the small backpack factory founded with grant assistance from UMN to help people who had lost their jobs because of the pandemic. People with disability and their families supported to make a living, get medical help, and connect with each other to provide mutual support and oppose traditional stigmas. Health posts and local hospitals in all our working areas equipped to respond to COVID-19. Schools supported to bring students back and help them resume education after the long lockdown.

When Joel last visited Mugu district in late 2016, he was struck by the deep-rooted injustices that had emptied most schools in the upper Mugu Karnali valley. Most teachers were drawing their salaries without actually going to the remote villages, and the ethnic minority Karmarong population was too politically isolated to assert its rights. Today, thanks in significant part to the long advocacy efforts of UMN's local partner NGO, the schools have teachers and we're working with a receptive local government to strengthen education there. UMN has consistently strong positive relationships with the local governments that see our work close-up; please pray that this will extend more consistently to the central level where our agreements are signed!

We returned to Kathmandu and a wonderful official farewell at UMN, where we celebrated the last few years and looked forward to the achievements to come under Dhana Lama, UMN's first Nepali executive director. We feel we've had a wonderful ending to our time at UMN.

We do not expect that will be the end of our time in Nepal, however. As we mentioned in our February newsletter, Fiona will be starting MSc/PhD research on medicinal plants at the University of Kent. Her primary focus will be on *Artemisia annua*, a plant that has long been used around the world against falciparum malaria and is now in clinical trials as a COVID-19 treatment. It is indigenous to Nepal but little-studied there, and Fiona has had enthusiastic support for her proposed research not only from Kent but from the Royal Botanical Gardens in Edinburgh and Nepal's own National Herbarium (which is assessing some samples she brought back from our April travels).



We hope that from spring or summer 2023 we will be able to return to Nepal on Fiona's research visa. After the many ups and downs of the last few years, Joel is looking forward to a quieter season as house-dad, primary child-carer, and writer.

Meanwhile we would be grateful for prayer for this year in the UK as a family—especially for Caleb and Isaac, who we hope find good friends at school and church in Canterbury.

We hope you will continue to pray for the United Mission to Nepal and its faithful service to Nepal. Please consider signing up for their weekly prayer updates at <u>https://www.umn.org.np/pray</u>. Kirk O'Muir

Kirk O'Muir is situated in the Carron Valley which is in the large and diverse parish of St Ninians. It is an old burial ground where in the 17th century man and women gathered to worship God. They became known as Covenanters - people who were determined to defend Presbyterianism and to oppose state interference in spiritual matters.

Covenanters - the name given because they had signed two Covenants supporting the freedom of the Church - gathered throughout the country in remote and isolated places. Ministers who were supportive of the cause, preached in the open air, and it was at that time that Conventicles were introduced.

Many Covenanters were dealt with harshly by the state and a number went to the gallows. It has been said of them; "The scaffold could not daunt them; Instruments of torture could not make them quail; the sufferings and discomforts of cave or moor or prison cell could not move them to act and speak against their conscience - the love of Christ spread abroad in their hearts ever spurred them on to do and to suffer."

These courageous saints of an age long gone can yet encourage and inspire us as we seek to serve Christ faithfully in our day.

The Unlikely Street Pastor

I only went to the information evening to find out how our church donations were being used. I had no intention of becoming a Street Pastor and had every excuse why I would not be able to be one – my family wouldn't like it, the training would disrupt some weekends, I wouldn't manage the late nights even although part of me thought I should still be out partying.

Suffice to say I went home full of enthusiasm for the organisation. When I mentioned I had been asked to observe a patrol all the family were very supportive.

I didn't expect to find on that first patrol that picking up broken glass and putting flip-flops on sore feet could be such a moving experience – it was amazing to feel that these actions were a positive witness of God's love for the people on our streets. We have a friendly city and all the people we met were supportive and welcomed us being on the street.

Several years later I am still a Street Pastor. The experiences on the street and the people I have met have strengthened my faith and enhanced my spiritual journey.

Stirling Street Pastors continue to patrol on the streets most Friday and Saturday nights and in recent years have been fortunate enough to be allowed onto the university campus where we have regular Friday lunchtime patrols.

Street Pastors like many organisations need new volunteers each year as Pastors leave the area or are no longer able to patrol. We currently are down at around 24 volunteers but pray that we will reach our target of 32 to ensure no patrols are cancelled and we have some flexibility.

A company of the Boys' Brigade have been meeting in St Ninians since 1893 and since returning from lockdown the 8th Stirling haven't looked back. Already back up to pre-pandemic numbers, our boys come each week with enthusiasm, excitement and a real sense of fun. It is through this fun and enthusiasm, rooted within the Christian faith that allows us to continue to offer a diverse and varied programme. For example, this session has seen Lego days, 10 pin bowling and Adventure days. In writing this article I asked one of our senior boys Hugh to share a little about what the BB means to him,

"During the covid-19 pandemic everything changed for most people. Whether it was staying inside or not being able to see friends and family it has taken its toll on everyone.

Boys Brigade was one of the things that stayed constant throughout, whether it was online sessions or getting involved with BB at home where we would have sports challenges, food challenges such as making milkshakes and sharing our results with the rest of the company section. All together the BB continues to be an amazing experience, especially after covid. I'm so excited to see what's in store for the next year and to watch our Company Section grow as the Juniors and Anchors come up and watch them have as much fun on a Friday night as I do."



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
