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
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#### From the Manse

Dear Friends,

The Moderator, the Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson, chose as his theme for the General Assembly, 'Building Together.'

He made the point that as a Church we are not only called to work together, but that we are to use the many and varied gifts God has given to us, to build together and make a difference in communities the length and breadth of Scotland and beyond.





Trustees, gave a report to the General Assembly in which he said:

# "The Church is in the midst of necessary transformation. Limited resources challenge us, yet they also serve as a catalyst for innovation. Our commitment to future mission and evangelism stands undeterred."

It was good to hear this, and a timely reminder that at this time of challenge and change we should not lose sight of our primary task, which is to share the good news of the Gospel, and to make known the love of God through the words we speak and the things we do.

When the Kirk Session reflected on comments made in response to the questionnaire that was circulated last summer, we realised, among other things, that there is a need to strengthen the link between our congregation and the community in which we are situated, and for which we have a responsibility.

As a consequence, it was agreed that we should have an 'Open Day' with people from the community, and others who are interested, having an opportunity to visit the Church and Parish Halls when we will share what we do as a congregation, the opportunities that exist for coming together, the organisations and groups we have, and the charities we support throughout the year.

The 'Open Day' will be on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> September from 11am – 3pm and tea, coffee and home baking will be served.

If you have any ideas that will help us strengthen the link with the community or would like to be involved in planning the 'Open Day' please speak to me or one of the elders.

Recently, I came across words that struck a chord with me. I believe that like the words spoken by Dr Paterson and Mr Cameron, they are particularly relevant at this time when, confronted by some rather bleak figures about membership and finance, one could be tempted to withdraw into ourselves and neglect the all-important work we have to do.

#### Kirk O' Muir



The open-air service at Kirk O' Muir is held on the first Sunday of August at 12 noon. Kirk O' Muir is situated in the Carron Valley and was once the site of a chapel dedicated to St Mary in the 15<sup>th</sup> century.

It was at Kirk O' Muir that people known as Covenanters met to worship God. They were people who had signed

various covenants such as the National Covenant in 1638 and who believed the state had no right to interfere in spiritual matters. They upheld the Presbyterian form of Church government.

The Covenants were denounced as illegal and many of those who had signed them were sent to the gallows. Others were jailed or made to leave the country.

The service this year will be on Sunday 4<sup>th</sup> August at 12 noon. The service in the Old Parish on that date will be at 10am.

They were installed in 1940 and are the work of Douglas Hamilton who was born in 1895 and died in 1959.

Foliage and birds are depicted at the top and bottom of both windows with much of the rest being lightly coloured with a central panel of an angel. The one on the left is praying while the one on the right holds a wheatsheaf.

#### Easter Journey – Schools Programme 2024

As part of our School Programmes covering Christmas, Easter and Pentecost, we hosted over 130 Primary 6 children from our feeder schools-Borestone, St Ninians and Allans- over 5 sessions in late March.

This is a joint venture with St Ninians Old Parish Church and we are very grateful to all the volunteers who helped in many different ways to deliver the programme.

Our aim is to help the children to understand



why, we as Christians, celebrate Easter and the events leading up to Christ's death and resurrection. This is done in a variety of ways with a quiz, spontaneous dramavery popular-and the main part of the session involving the children moving round 4 experiences which Jesus and his followers would have been part of -the Passover meal, the arrest in the garden, the crowd before Pilate and the cross itself.

We particularly want to get across to the children that at the beginning of the last week of Jesus's life, he arrived in Jerusalem with great excitement and by the end of the week he had been condemned to die. But this was not the end.

Obviously, some of the pupils know that he rose again-particularly the boys who are part of the Boys Brigade.

At the end of the session, we ask the children to comment on what they have learned and what might still be puzzling them.

Some of the comments are quite insightful: 'I wonder why everyone couldn't get along?'

'I already knew that the stone rolled away from the tomb and Jesus got crucified but I didn't know that they ate special food at the last supper, and it was delicious!'

'People tend to follow the crowd'.

## *'I have learned that Jesus wanted peace with no fighting and Jesus healed any injuries on other people'.*

#### Wanderings in Leith SANDRA AND JESSIE SCOBBIE



On a recent visit to Leith we decided to take a path less travelled on one of our morning walks. Sighting a beautiful tower with Dutch style steeple ahead it reminded us of our own one here in Stirling. Once outside the building we were surprised to read on the blue historical plaque that this had been the 'Old St Ninians Church'. Thought to be one of the oldest buildings in Leith. There has been a St Ninians Chapel on the site since 1493 established by Robert Ballantyne, the Abbot of Holyrood, and was served by two chaplains. After the English raids in 1544 and 1547 it was left in ruins. The people of North Leith rebuilt it after the reformation of 1560. In 1609 the Parish of North Leith was created and the old chapel became the Parish Church. The distinctive tower being added in 1675. Inside then there was a three sided gallery decorated with the emblems of the Trades Incorporations of North Leith. Over the years that followed many different congregations worshipped in the building. In 1816 the minister and congregation moved to a new site and the building complex was given over to industrial uses. In 1997 the old manse, belfry and adjacent building were purchased by the Cockburn Conservation Trust being

restored as use for domestic accommodation and office space.

After a few hundred years the tower, as like ours, remains standing. A reminder within both communities of our history and the diverse groups of people that have contributed to the areas we now know.

On our final morning we went on a search to find the Old Leith Theatre and Library. But first another fine building with very tall spire and unusual burial ground to the side caught our attention. On reading its historical blue plaque we were surprised to read it was the 'North Leith Parish Church'. It was built to replace the one on the site of 'Old St Ninians Church' we stumbled across the day before. When that had become too small for its large congregation The North Leith Parish Church was built to replace it on Madeira Street in 1816. The church was designed by architect William Burn. He was a highly regarded Scottish architect and one of the three leaders of Edinburgh neoclassicism. The building was damaged during World War Two but repaired by 1950.





Whilst admiring the church from outside the minister

and another church member were opening the gates. After a discussion around the church and being informed that it was due to close in the coming weeks we were invited in for an impromptu guided tour. We could sense the history of the building as the sun shone through the beautiful stained glass windows. The congregation now having to conserve the life of a church through its recorded objects and on historical boards. On-leaving we were invited to write in their visitor book. We were able to offer good wishes in going forward from ourselves mentioning our own St Ninians Old Parish Church, Stirling.

Sad to advise North Leith Parish Church closed its doors on Easter Sunday. During what is another significant period of change for the churches in Scotland we felt it was a timely coincidence for us to have stumbled across these two old historical buildings of Leith connecting us to home.

#### A Walk in the Woods HELEN COOK

One of our favourite walks in early Spring takes us through Balquhidderock

Wood. When we first came to Stirling, in early Spring we were amazed to see the floor of these woods covered in little white wood anemones. After a couple of weeks, the white flowers were joined by bluebells. Each year the number of bluebells seems to increase, especially at the end of the woods nearest to the Bannockburn – perhaps because fewer people take that walk. We walked there



last Sunday afternoon with one of our daughters and her two little children. There were lots of puddles (and mud!) for the children to enjoy, and there were large swathes of bluebells scattered through the trees.

It makes me think of Jesus' words, "See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these." But most of us are aware that our natural world is under great pressure from climate change, which is in part at least brought about by how we live in it.

A hymn written by Shirley Erena Murray from New Zealand, encourages us all to work for the healing of our small, shared planet. I think we need to ask God to give us spiritual strength to face this crisis at many levels. Here is a part of her hymn, number 243 in our hymn book:

Touch the earth lightly, Use the earth gently, Nourish the life of the world in our care; Gifts of great wonder; Ours to surrender; Trust for the children tomorrow will bear.

Let there be greening, Birth from the burning, Water that blesses and air that is sweet, Health in God's garden, Hope in God's children, Regeneration that peace will complete.

#### Obeying a tap on the shoulder MARGARET SIBBALD

Lacking the education he needed to become a foreign missionary, Peter Marshall left his native Scotland for the USA in 1927 and worked at several jobs before becoming accepted as a candidate for the ministry.

As a preacher at Washington's historic New York Avenue Presbyterian Church and as chaplain of the US Senate, he gained renown for his sermons, some of which appeared in *Mr Jones Meets the Master*.

He wrote:

Now if you were walking down the street and someone came up behind you and tapped you on the shoulder..... what would you do?

Naturally you would turn round.

Well, that is what happens in the spiritual world. A man walks through life with the external call ringing in his ears but with no response stirring in his heart and suddenly without any warning, the Holy Spirit taps him on the shoulder.

What happens? He turns round. The word repentance means turning around. He repents , believes and is saved.

The Tap on the Shoulder is the almighty power of God acting without help or hindrance upon the chosen fallen sinner so as to produce a new creature and lead him into the particular work which God has for him.

As Jesus passed on from there, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax office; and said to him "Follow Me." Matthew 9:9

Now I realise I'd much rather people went out with a smile on their faces, and I remembered these lines that I'd written for a Church event some years ago. They're somewhat irreverent, but they may resonate with some ladies of the congregation.

I joined the Church long years ago Way back in sixty-seven Little did I know way back then I'd have to bake my way to Heaven. Yes, I've whisked up many a pancake. Meringues give me no worry. And I'm just the wee wummin For scones in a hurry. But lately there has come to me A wee perplexing thought I thocht I couldnae share it But then again— why not? For it's when Saint Peter meets me At thon pearly gate Will he smile and sav— Welcome child Or will he...Just haud oot his plate?

#### The Gospels ARTHUR S WALLS

#### St. Mark's Gospel

For the Spring edition of *The Parishioner*, my article was about St. Luke's Gospel. My article for the Summer edition is about St. Mark's Gospel.

Mark's opening sentence - "The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God" - packs a real punch. The startling truth is out: the purpose of the Gospel and its message are on the table from the outset.

This is the shortest of the Gospels and probably the first to be written. There is a strong early tradition that John Mark wrote The Gospel in Rome, setting down Jesus' story as he heard it directly from the apostle Peter.

Mark shows us Jesus in action, convincing us by the things he does that his claim to be the Son of God is true.

#### Who was Mark?

The name "John Mark" occurs often in Acts and the New Testament Letters ('John" is the Jewish name, "Mark" the Latin). His mother had a house in Jerusalem where Jesus' followers met in the days of the early church. And he was cousin to Paul's companion, Barnabas. Mark blotted his copy book with Paul by going home half-way through the first missionary tour. But Barnabas gave him a second chance, and he later won the respect of Paul and Peter. He was a real comfort to Paul in prison (Colossians 4). And Peter, whose companion he became, loved him as his own son (1 Peter 5:13).

My own favourite story from Mark's Gospel is to be found in Chapter 7, verses 24 to 30.

It is often said that Jesus went on holiday accompanied by some of his disciples and moved into the territory of Tyre. He found a house to stay in, and would have liked to remain unrecognised, but that was impossible. Almost at once a woman, whose small daughter was possessed by an unclean spirit, heard of him and fell at his feet (the woman was a Gentile, a Phoenician of Syria by nationality). She begged him to drive the demon out of her daughter. "Son of David! Have pity on me; my daughter is tormented by a devil." He said not a word in reply. His disciples came and urged him, "Send her away! See how she comes shouting after us." Jesus replied, "I was sent to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, and to them alone." But the woman who had fallen at his feet cried, "Help me, sir." Jesus replied, "It is not right to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." "True, sir," she answered, "and yet the dogs eat the scraps that fall from their master's table." Hearing this Jesus replied, "What faith you have! Let it be as you wish!" And from that moment her daughter was restored to health.

In many ways Jesus was indulging in a bit of banter with the woman. His curing miracles were for the lost sheep of the house of Israel which he called the children's bread. While she was a non-Jew likened to being a dog. The woman went along with this and was happy to take the crumbs that fell from the master's table, as dogs do as anyone who has a dog will know. It shows Jesus sense of humour and saw the woman going along with his banter. He could not deny the dog taking the crumbs that fell from his master's table.

As I said earlier, Mark shows us Jesus in action, convincing us by the things he does that his claim to be the Son of God is true.


The mystery to everyone is: We do not know at which station We ourselves will step down. So we must live in the best way, love, forgive and offer the best of who we are.
